#### Seniors at Royal Cape GC



Our first competitive match as we play against the Western Cape Seniors. Unfortunately, we are a man down as Giles has succumbed to the pervasive Plague that is engulfing us slowly.

Match manager, Nigel reports:

This is the culmination of the first leg of our South African tour. He thanks our hosts for

their most generous and warm welcome from the moment we arrived at Cape Town International Airport. Following the "4Cs" formula he gives thanks first for the Course. Royal Cape GC is the oldest in South Africa founded in 1885, receiving its royal status in 1910 in December - a timely Christmas present from George V. Our match at Royal Durban Golf Club is the first of our three with the Kwa Zulu Natal (KWN) Seniors, and is played as a Mixed Golf match, the only such on the tour. Royal Durban is surrounded by the Greyville horse-race track and Turf Club. It's the sixth oldest golf club in South Ăfrica, founded as Durban Golf Club in 1892, and

becoming Royal Durban in 1932, so the perfect place to start our matches with the KZN Seniors.

The course has had quite a bit of damage from recent floods, but this does not stop us from having a great day's golf and renewing the SGS's warm ties with the KZN Seniors and with Royal Durban. The day finishes with a delicious braai in the clubhouse.

Speeches include John Saville's thanks to the KZN Seniors and to Royal Cape, in which he is also able to mention his Grandfather who had raced horses at the Turf Club in the 1950 / 60s.

The mixed golf is played in Fourballs as an Alliance with South African couples. There are some good scores, with the Cunninghams and their partners taking the spoils with 86 points.

#### Day 13 Thursday 13th March Match vs KZN Seniors at Durban **Country Club**

#### Match Manager – Giles Sanderson

Established in 1922, DCC had a major overhaul following devastating floods in 2022 which closed the course. It was reopened on the 1st March 2024 after a significant upgrade, which included a wide burn being built, which snakes through a number of the holes at the far end of the course, and 18 new greens being built and then seeded with bent grass, which was used for the first time at a coastal KwaZulu-Natal ("KZN") coastal course.

The club recently held its 17th South African Open (27 Feb to 2 March), more than any other SA course, with the first being held at DCC in 1924. KZN experienced terrible weather and rain at the beginning of this month, and, despite the recent extensive course work and the burn, the fourth round was cancelled due to a partially flooded course. Dylan Naidoo won the championship with a birdie on the Sunday on the 18th hole in a sudden death format.

Luckily for us, nine holes had reopened the previous week and all 18 holes were reopened only the day before our visit and so we had a match on the full course, which was in remarkable condition all things considered.

The plucky visitors battle hard but go down 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, with Tour Leader Ian Whittaker having a strong back nine with some gritty putts to wrestle back a looming defeat from three down at the turn, at which point one of the oppo has to give up. John Terry-Lloyd had left his golf shoes at home, bought a new pair in the pro-shop, but a size too small, and the pain after nine holes of walking is too much. No buggies are allowed on the soft turf, so he heads in for an early bath / beer.

With a generous concession on the 18th for a halved match by Ian and his partner Giles Sanderson against the now solo-oppo of former Springbok hockey player and R&A

member Alistair Forbes. lan achieves his first (part) point of the tour.

We receive a very warm reception from the club members who had arranged a St Patrick's day theme for the day in their palatial clubhouse, which has no fewer than 15 function rooms.



They also have a strict dress code of smart casual when not on the course. The clubhouse is spacious and cool with a wonderful verandah giving fine views of the opening and finishing holes. After a day of golf on an immaculately presented course, most of us have considerable sympathy for these rules.

The match is played as an Alliance with 12 South African Seniors, very few of whom are actually members of the River Club. I (Adrian Stoddart) am lucky enough to play with the President of the Gauteng Seniors, Stuart Morris and a former Captain, John Marshall. Stuart is a retired banker and John a retired executive of a gold mining enterprise.


