HUGH KELLY

'UNCLE HUGH' - A LIFE DEVOTED TO THE GAME



Few individuals have shaped South African senior golf as profoundly as Hugh Kelly.

Affectionately known as "Uncle Hugh", he was a larger-than-life figure whose influence extended far beyond the fairways. A civil engineer by profession, he built a successful career across South Africa and Namibia, but it was in Port Alfred, where he settled in 1959, that his enduring legacy in golf truly began.

Hugh joined Eastern Province Seniors in 1963, became President in 1969, and was elected National President in 1975. He went on to represent and captain sides in senior tournaments around the world, earning deep respect both locally and internationally.

At Royal Port Alfred Golf Club, his impact was extraordinary. He served as President for 31 years, helping shape the club into what it is today. In recognition, the opening hole was renamed in

his honour, a lasting tribute to his contribution.

His standing in the game was equally remarkable. Hugh was a member of 47 golf clubs worldwide, including the Royal and Ancient at St Andrews, and in 1974 was made an Honorary Life Member of the South African Golf Union.

Yet, it is his generosity that defines him most. Whether supporting clubs, contributing equipment, or backing initiatives beyond golf, Hugh gave freely and often quietly. As many would say, there was little point in asking; he had likely already given.

Above all, Hugh was a man of warmth and humour. He loved his fellow golfers and was famous for hosting "birthday" drinks, celebrations that were less about the date and more about the company. And, inevitably, the drinks were always on him.

A remarkable life.
A lasting legacy.

OPERATIONAL INFORMATION

THE DRAW

The draw has been carefully compiled to ensure all players compete on both courses, avoid playing with members of their own society (except during Pinehurst), and do not play with the same competitor more than once. Tee times accommodate shared travel and reasonable requests where possible. We trust you will enjoy a balanced and varied championship experience.

HANDICAP & CLASS COMPETITIONS

Handicap Indexes are extracted from the official database prior to the tournament and remain fixed throughout. For each round, your Index is converted to a Course Handicap based on the course, tee position and format. This appears on your scorecard.

Five age classes (A-E) apply, determined at registration. Classes A-D are evenly distributed by age, with Class E defined annually according to the field profile. Awards are presented for the best 36-hole Stableford scores in each class. The Class E winner receives the Methuselah Trophy.

TEEING & SCORECARDS

The tournament is played from a single set of tees. Please report to the Starter at least 10 minutes before your scheduled tee time.

Scorecards and local rules are issued on the tee. Completed cards must be submitted immediately after your round.

PACE OF PLAY

To maintain a consistent flow:

- Keep position with the group ahead
- Play without delay
- Pick up when you can no longer score or assist your partner
- Follow all instructions from Course Marshals (Rule 5.6a may apply)
- No practice is permitted on the course during play

PRIZES & TWO CLUBS

Only one individual prize may be awarded per player per day (excluding team events). In the event of a tie, the prize is awarded to the senior player.

Monday and Tuesday prizes are presented following the Annual Members Meeting on Tuesday, 5 May. Championship prizes are awarded at the Gala Dinner on Thursday evening.

The two-club entry is prepaid and may be collected upon submission of your scorecard. Two clubs are not awarded for the Pinehurst competition.

DRESS CODE AFTER PLAY

Smart casual attire is recommended. Name badges should be worn after golf and at all official functions.

REFUND POLICY

Cancellations received before 24 March qualify for a full refund. Where deposits have been paid by the host Society, refunds cannot be issued.

GOLF CARTS

Golf carts are allocated according to entry requests and detailed in your welcome letter. Cart fees are R450 at both clubs.

CADDIES

Caddies are not available at either course.

PRACTICE & CATERING

Both courses offer practice facilities. Driving ranges open from 07h30.

Breakfast and light refreshments are available from 07h30.

BANKING

Both clubs accept credit cards. Both courses operate on a cashless basis. Please plan accordingly. There are no ATM facilities at either club.

PLAYING FEES

No playing fees apply during the tournament.

The Sunday mixed competition is for the player's own account. Preferential practice-round rates apply on Sunday.

SECURITY

The clubs cannot accept responsibility for loss of personal items. Please do not leave valuables in locker rooms or golf bags.

HUMEWOOD GOLF CLUB

Senior golfers have waited 10 years for the return of the National Tournament to the iconic Humewood links. In that time, the hosting coastal city has renamed itself Gqeberha, the Xhosa word for the Baakens River that flows through the heart of the city into Algoa Bay.

Port Elizabeth Golf Club has retained its historic name and will again serve as the second course during the four-day tournament.

Humewood, home of the Eastern Province Senior Society, is a superb example of links architecture from golf’s golden age. Designed by Colonel S. V. Hotchkin and

opened in 1929, it remains South Africa’s only true links. During the summer of 1927/28, Hotchkin travelled the country advising clubs on improvements. Only the members of PE Golf Club asked him to design an entirely new course, set among windswept dunes beside Algoa Bay.

That decision shaped South African golf history. While other seaside courses have claimed links status, only at Humewood do players experience authentic links golf across all 18 holes. Hotchkin positioned the clubhouse centrally,

allowing the two nines to run in opposing directions, with holes constantly changing orientation to the wind.

Initially remote and rugged, eight kilometres from the city centre, Humewood appealed to adventurous golfers, while many preferred the accessibility of PEGC. Yet it quickly became the championship venue, hosting the SA Amateur and SA Open in 1934. Sid Brews won the Open with a 72-hole total of 319 and returned in 1952 for his eighth and final Open victory, still unable to break 300.

Hotchkin created eight unusually long holes that were bogey 5s in that era, three running east, three west, and two north-south. The par remained 76 until the 1970s. Bobby Locke, winner of the 1940 Open, named the wide 10th among his favourites, while the uphill 13th is regarded as one of South Africa’s sternest par-4s.

Humewood’s defining feature is the wind. The prevailing westerly turns several par-4s into three-shot tests, while downwind par-5s offer scoring chances. A strengthening easterly makes the back-nine par-3s especially demanding, and the short par-3 sixth is often a card-wrecker.

After a dry Eastern Cape summer, firm fairways and true bent-grass greens promise classic links conditions. The refurbished clubhouse, overlooking Algoa Bay, completes the experience.

PORT ELIZABETH GOLF CLUB

One of South Africa's most historic golf clubs, known locally as "The Hill," Port Elizabeth Golf Club was founded in 1890. Golf has been played at this Mill Park parkland venue for almost 125 years.

In recent years the club has emerged as one of the most progressive in the Eastern Cape. Solar panels on the clubhouse roof provide energy security, padel courts have been introduced, and clubhouse facilities have been extensively upgraded. A ClearVu security fence is being installed around the perimeter following incidents of vandalism and theft

after sections of the public began using the fairways as picnic areas.

Significant attention has also been given to

course improvements, including resurfaced greens and reshaped holes. With welcome rainfall before the National Tournament, dams and water hazards should be replenished, restoring the property's full aesthetic appeal.

“The Hill” has traditionally been busier than Humewood due to its central location and shelter from prevailing winds. Mature trees frame many holes, creating a classic parkland setting.

In 1917 the course briefly served as Port Elizabeth's first airstrip. A plane from Cape Town landed on a fairway but struck a cross-bunker, damaging its wooden propeller. A member salvaged it, and it still hangs in the clubhouse.

Bob Grimsdell remodelled the course in the early 1950s, hosting exhibition matches featuring Bobby Locke and Gary Player. A major upgrade in 2001/02 rebuilt and contoured the greens, modernised bunkering and introduced two new holes, reducing the par to 72. The fourth is now a sharp dogleg-left par-4, while the fifth is a demanding downhill par 3.

The club hosted numerous SA championships, including the first 72-hole SA Open in 1908. The SA Amateur returned in 1974, and in the club's centenary year Retief Goosen claimed the title. More recently, the men's SA Strokeplay was held here in 2015 and the women's SA Amateur in 2025.

“The Hill” is a shot-maker's course defined by doglegs and variety. The eighth tempts long hitters to attack over the dam. The par-3 17th demands precision with water guarding the green, while the narrow hourglass second and the driveable 16th complete a challenging and memorable layout.

COMPETITIONS AND TROPHIES

At the SGUSA Strategy Planning Meeting in October 2025, attended by the Management Committee and representatives from all societies, the National Tournament competitions and trophies were formally reviewed. Following this review, it was agreed to discontinue the Gross Stableford class competitions. Historical results confirmed that these events were consistently won by the lowest-handicap players in each class and were no longer serving the broader field as originally intended. From the 2026 Tournament onward, several new trophies will be introduced and the prize-giving structure updated as outlined below.

TEAM AWARDS

- **Team Winners and Runners-Up:** Determined by the combined Stableford scores of the best three out of four team members across the two championship days.
- Teams are selected by each society.

SOCIETY TROPHY

- Awarded to the society with the highest average Stableford score per player over the two championship days.

DAILY (18-HOLE)

- Four awards will be presented — one per course on each championship day.

AGE CLASSES

Age classes remain based on age at registration and will now be structured annually according to the actual age distribution of the field. Five classes (A-E) will apply. Classes A-D will be evenly distributed by age, with the lower boundary of Class E determined each year based on field demographics.

Your allocated age class will be confirmed in your welcome letter upon registration on 3 May.

CLASS STABLEFORD AWARDS

Winner and runner-up for the best 36-hole Stableford scores in each class (A-E). New trophies will be introduced for Classes A-D. The Class E winner will receive the Methuselah Trophy. The Methuselah Cup will be retired.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Admiral Benson Putter

Awarded to the player aged 80+ recording the highest Stableford score on either championship day.

Championship Stableford

The winner receives the Leslie Satchwell Trophy. The runner-up receives a new trophy.

Gross (Scratch) Championship

The winner receives the Carlton Levick Trophy. The runner-up receives a new trophy.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

A YEAR OF STABLE GOVERNANCE, INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT AND DISCIPLINED FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP.

The Management Committee (Mancom) is pleased to present its report on the affairs of the Union for the year ended 31 December 2025.

During March 2025, the Union welcomed a touring party from the Senior Golfers' Society of the United Kingdom. The tour was superbly hosted by the Western Cape, Southern Cape, KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng Societies, and was widely praised by our visitors.

In May, the 84th National Tournament was successfully hosted by the Free State Society and was both enjoyable and well organised. In March 2026, the Union again hosted an incoming tour, this time from the Senior Golfers' Society of Australia. A full report on that tour will be presented next year.

The Union continues to operate on a sound footing, supported by a secure financial base and effective administration. Over

time, Mancom has developed systems and protocols for the management of international tours and for the direction and oversight of National Tournaments. The Union looks forward to the Eastern Province Society hosting the forthcoming National Tournament in Gqeberha and to welcoming our Zambian colleagues to participate.

Mancom remains mindful of the headwinds facing certain Societies, including ageing and contracting membership, geographic relocation of members, and the growing prevalence of composite or annual green fee structures which may affect participation in inter-society matches. In response, Mancom convened a strategic meeting in October with the President, President-designate and representatives of the Societies. Proposals, including possible adjustments to the composition of Mancom, are under consideration and will be addressed at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Union remains financially stable. A summary of the unaudited financial statements is attached, with audited statements to follow.

Budget

The proposed budget for the year ending 31 December 2026 reflects a projected surplus of R40 530. This is stated before provision for development grants and assumes the National Tournament achieves a break-even result.

TOURS

The 2025 incoming UK tour and the 2026 Australian tour were both highly successful, receiving exceptionally positive feedback. Mancom records its appreciation to the host Societies for their continued commitment in organising and delivering these tours.

NATIONAL TOURNAMENT

The 2025 National Tournament in Bloemfontein was efficiently organised and warmly received. Operational systems, including registration and score capture, performed effectively. Course presentation was commendable despite challenging seasonal conditions. Constructive feedback has been noted and will inform future refinements. Overall, the tournament strengthened camaraderie and reinforced the high standard of the Union's flagship event.

CONCLUSION

Mancom records its appreciation to its members for their continued commitment and service to the Union. Special acknowledgement is extended to John Brownrigg and Colin Esslemont, who retired during the year after a combined 22 years of dedicated service.

AGELESS GOLF MY ADVICE FOR SENIORS BY BERNHARD LANGER

Bernhard Langer is the oldest winner of a PGA Tour Champions event. Langer, 68, did it in 2024 at age 67 (Charles Schwab Cup). But here's a fun fact: Guess who is the second oldest? It's also Langer. How about the third? Same. He has set the age record six times! Scott Hoch, at age 63, is the next oldest. They say golf might be the only sport you play more as you get older, not less. This could explain, in part, why Langer's career seems to defy the laws of nature. Langer has won a record 47 tournaments since he turned 50 (Hale Irwin won the second most with 45). Langer spoke to Golf Digest about how to slow down Father Time and keep playing golf at a high level as you age.

ADDRESS AND BACKSWING

You can still make a full turn (just not like you used to do it)

I have narrowed my stance compared to other seniors because it helps me rotate better. If you stand too wide, it tends to restrict the hips – and many of you are already stiff in the hips – so it will limit your backswing length. For me, a wider stance also gets me swaying off the ball, which can hurt your ball-striking. Solid contact is more important than ever as you get older. I might have lost distance with my driver because I don't stand wide with all that spine tilt away from the target, but I make better contact. I've always felt like I'm more precise with a narrower stance.

My head swivels as I take the club back. I've had a stiff neck for years, so my head must do that. It's the only way I can make a full backswing. However, allowing your head to rotate a little as you swing back does help promote a better turn.

THROUGH-SWING

Take pressure off your spine and release the club

The way I swing now, with more of an emphasis on trapping the ball and reducing the amount of spine tilt through impact, helps keep my lower back healthy. This is a swing you can use for a long time. The feeling you want is your chest stays over the ball as the club moves through the hitting area. Some people call it "covering the ball," and it puts less stress on your spine while still providing pop to your drives and other full-swing shots. You still want a little tilt away from the target through the hitting area but the feeling is that you're more centred and not hanging back.

To compensate for a lack of distance, you might consider getting your forearms and wrists more involved in the strike. When I turned 60, I started to lose distance. I tried swinging harder but my back hurt, so I had to find another way to generate power. One way to do that is by utilising the hinging and unhinging of the wrists and rotation of the forearms. They can create real speed for golfers who can't get as much power anymore from leg strength and hip rotation. I like to feel I create speed just before the club gets to the ball, and that comes from a "release" of the wrists and a rotation of the forearms through impact. I trap the ball and compress it.

SHORT GAME

For seniors, this is the great equaliser

You don't need strength to have a good short game. Even better, you won't wear yourself out practising around the greens. I knew as I got older, I had to become a better short-game player to make up for having to hit longer shots into greens. If you can routinely get up and down, it does level the playing field. Firstly, try using different clubs to hit these shots around the greens. Try chipping with a pitching wedge or a 9-iron, 8-iron, even a hybrid. Get good at running the ball up to the hole. How much you get your hands and wrists involved in these shots is up to you, but I will say letting the club do most of the work is probably going to help you a lot more if you aren't someone who practices much. Even hitting chips with a 6-iron like you're making a putting stroke is going to be a reliable shot.



PUTTING

Feeling shaky? You might need a fresh approach

It's no secret I've had the yips multiple times, and I've gone to using a long putter to help make a better stroke. Standing taller takes some of the pressure off my lower back that using a standard-length putter and stance can cause. Truthfully, though, I don't think it's easy to use a long putter. It's harder. But if you're bad with a short putter or you feel like your hands are too shaky, give one a go. It might bring the one thing to your putting that is the difference between success and failure. That thing is comfort. Whatever putter you use, however you stand over the ball or hold the club, that's the key to putting. Use the approach that gives you the most confidence and belief in yourself.

FITNESS

Don't hate the gym. It's going to be your best friend

One thing I've learned is that we sit too much. I was given a stretch by a physical therapist which I do before and after gym, before I play, even before I go to bed. It opens your front side from your toes all the way through your hips – all the parts of your body that get short and tight from sitting. You can do this stretch standing or kneeling. I do it standing with my arms braced in a door frame and my pelvis extended forward. Shift your hips forward and hold the extended position with one arm up for a few seconds, return to start, then do it a few more times, flipping leg positions.

I'm in the gym almost every day. On off days, it's 90 minutes. On days I'm playing, it's an hour and then I stretch after the round. That sounds a lot, but it's a big reason I'm able to stay out on tour as much as I do. It's typically about 30 to 60 minutes of cardio, usually the stationary bike or walking uphill on a treadmill. The rest of the time is stretching and light weights. The thing you must try to do is get the blood flow going. That's going to

help you feel and play your best, so focus on things that get you loosened up.

CHAMPIONS OF GQEBERHA

Across the history of the Senior National Tournament in Port Elizabeth, now Gqeberha, a remarkable calibre of champion has emerged. Among them, four Springbok sportsmen stand out, their achievements spanning multiple disciplines and defining eras of South African sport.

The National Tournament has long attracted exceptional competitors, but few editions have showcased such pedigree as those held in Gqeberha, where the champions' list reflects both golfing excellence and broader sporting distinction.

Leading that legacy is **Alastair Forbes** of KwaZulu-Natal, a former Springbok hockey international, who claimed the Senior Championship on both occasions the tournament was last staged in Port Elizabeth. His 2009 victory remains one of the most memorable, a record 36-hole total of 136, including a superb 64 at Humewood. He returned in 2016 to secure his sixth and final national title with a total of 149.

Another distinguished name is **Ray White** of Gauteng, a former Currie Cup cricketer, who claimed the 2002 championship with a winning score of 148, the first of his three titles.

The dominance of **Reg Taylor**, one of South Africa's finest golfers, is equally significant. A former Springbok and SA Open champion, Taylor won in Port Elizabeth in 1989 and 1995, with scores of 147 and 145 respectively. His 1995 victory marked his tenth national title, part of an extraordinary total of eleven championships between 1984 and 1996.

Earlier champions also contributed to this rich history. **Brian Humphrey**, a Humewood member, secured victory in 1983, while **Arthur Stewart**, another Springbok golfer and SA Open champion, won in 1977 and famously claimed the SA Amateur Championship at Humewood in 1957 in a 41-hole final.

The earliest of these notable champions, **Eric Dalton** of KwaZulu-Natal, won the Senior title in 1971. A Springbok cricketer and outstanding all-round sportsman, he had previously claimed the SA Amateur Championship in 1950 at Durban Country Club and went on to win the Senior title four times.

REG TAYLOR

A GIANT OF SOUTH AFRICAN AMATEUR GOLF

Reg Taylor is widely regarded as one of the finest amateur golfers South Africa has ever produced.

Introduced to the game by his father, CC Taylor, a provincial golfer, Reg quickly established himself as a prodigy, winning major junior titles before

building a career defined by consistency, excellence, and quiet authority.

Over more than five decades, he competed at the highest level, earning national honours and representing South Africa with distinction.

His achievements include multiple South African

Amateur titles, international victories, and appearances in prestigious global events, a record that firmly places him among the elite of the amateur game.

Beyond his results, Reg was admired for his composure, sportsmanship, and deep understanding of the game. His influence extended far beyond the scorecard, inspiring generations of golfers who followed.

Even in his senior years, his passion for the game never waned. He remained a formidable competitor and a respected figure within the golfing community.

A true amateur in the purest sense – and one of the game’s enduring greats.

“Two historic Cape courses. One unforgettable championship awaits.”

King David Mowbray and Royal Cape are the confirmed venues for the 2027 National Tournament in Cape Town. The last championship staged there was in 2017, when Wim Fourie (Gauteng North) claimed the Senior title with a winning score of 160 in demanding windy conditions.

These two classic parkland courses, set against magnificent mountain backdrops, lie 10 kilometres apart and are linked by the M5 highway. Between them they have hosted 17 SA Opens, the most recent in 1996 at Royal Cape. Royal Cape continues to host the Sunshine Tour’s Cape Town Open annually. Both courses are constrained by space and are therefore unable to accommodate the modern format of the SA Open.

Both clubs sit along the Cape Flats railway line, which in earlier years provided convenient transport between the city and the courses. The railway tracks run directly through King David Mowbray,

dividing the course into two sections connected by tunnels after leaving Pinelands Station. At Royal Cape, the line borders several holes and comes into play for a hook on the par-4 sixth and the par-3 15th.

Royal Cape, founded in 1885, is South Africa’s oldest golf club. Its colonial-style clubhouse celebrated its centenary in 2023 and remains a single-storey structure attractively positioned between the practice putting green and the opening tees. The club offers excellent practice facilities.

King David Mowbray — the two clubs merged in 2015 — features a recently modernised two-storey clubhouse and is easily accessible from the N2, which runs alongside the second and third holes. The par-4 15th is among the most picturesque in the Cape Peninsula, framed by the slopes of Devil’s Peak.

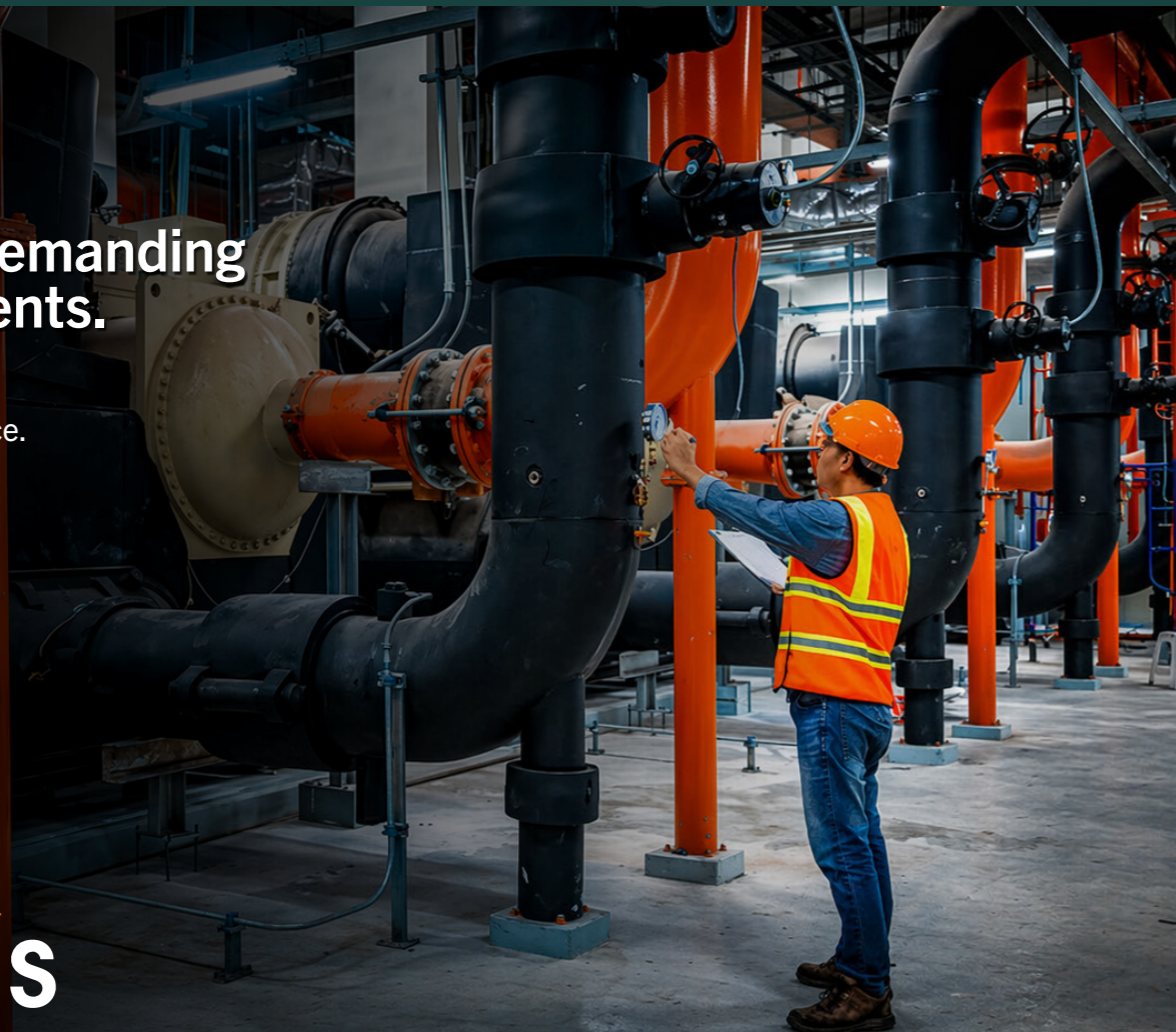
