## Introduction

The golf tour to Chile was made possible by the invitation extended to our society by AGOSECH (Asociación de Golf de Seniors de Chile). Behind the scenes, arrangements between Rob Wassenaar and John Brownrigg finalised the tour dates of 8 to 22 November 2015. The invitations were extended to society members in January 2015 and the team selected in March 2015.

As is the case on most tours we had a few late withdrawals. Brian Webber and Ron de Villiers withdrew for various reasons and we were able to find one replacement (Dave Horak) from the standby list.

The group of 11 men and nine ladies departed South Africa via various routes from Cape Town, Durban and Johannesburg arriving in Santiago on Sunday 8 November 2015.

For practical reasons we were all accommodated at the luxurious Santiago Marriott Hotel situated in the Las Condes District of Santiago which was a four minute walk from the high-end shopping mall at Falabella Parque Arauco and 13 km from downtown Santiago.

Santiago is set on a wide plain near the foot of the Andes and boasts one of the most dazzling backdrops of any capital city on earth. The views onto the towering cordillera after a rainstorm clears the air are truly magnificent,

especially in winter, when the snow-covered peaks rise behind the city like a giant white rampant against the blue sky (though smog, unfortunately, often obscures such vistas). The city itself is a rapidly expanding metropolis of around seven million people, and though long in the shadow of some other major South American cities, such as Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro, it has its own proud identity.

On Sunday evening after checking into the luxurious Marriott Hotel, the group was welcomed by David Tullo (Stand-in President), Victor Hawkins and Francisco Ruiz (Pancho) of Asociación de Golf Seniors de Chile (The AGOSECH) delegation.

## Golf activities during Tour of Chile

Golf in Chile dates back to the 1930's when the first golf association was formed. This association was disbanded and replaced by the Chilian Golf Federation (Federation Chilena de Golf) in 1948. Golf courses can be found up and down the vast length of the country but the majority are centred around Aconcagua and Santiago. Currently there are 60 golf clubs affiliated to the Federation.

We were privileged to play nine golf courses in the Santiago and Valparaíso Coastal region of which three were rated in the top ten golf courses of Chile. Los Leones established in 1910 and rated second, Rochas de Santo Domingo established in the 1940's and rated fourth, and by far the oldest course in Chile, Granadilla established in 1897 and rated ninth.

### Tuesday 10 November 2015 Club de Golf Los Leones

Los Leones is situated in the Las Condeos business district of Santiago surrounded by typical high rise buildings and was a short ten minute bus ride from the Marriott Hotel.

The course was set in fairly flat terrain with well-manicured bent-grass greens, outstanding bunkers and cynodon fairways. A few well-placed water hazards protected some of the par three holes.

The position of this club attracts many local business people who attend lunch on the various outside patios decorated with brightly coloured umbrellas and furniture. One such patio was used for the welcoming cocktail get together at which David Tullo (Stand-in President of AGOSECH) and Benjamin Hurtado spoke to the group.

During their welcome, Benjamin and David mentioned that the sudden death of the AGOSECH President (Elect Patricio Hurtado) just prior to this tour, had left a distinct vacuum in the society and apologised for his tragic absence at this opening event.

We all enjoyed the course and accompanying great clear summer conditions to post our first win of the tour. Four matches to two. Result: SA Seniors (4) and Chile Seniors (2).

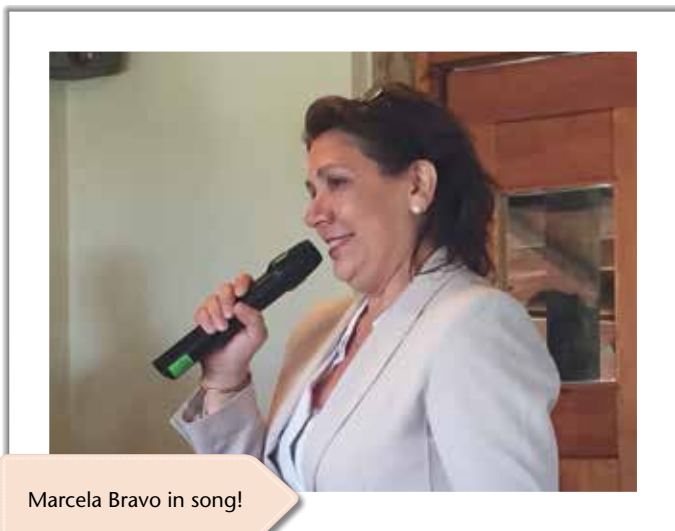

## Friday 13 November 2015 Club De Polo Rama Golf

As the name suggests this 18-hole layout is part of a larger country club catering for polo. The back nine which lies on fairly steep slopes has spectacular views of the city. Six polo fields were visible from the course on the lower perimeter as were the many stables capable of housing 800 horses during the polo season.

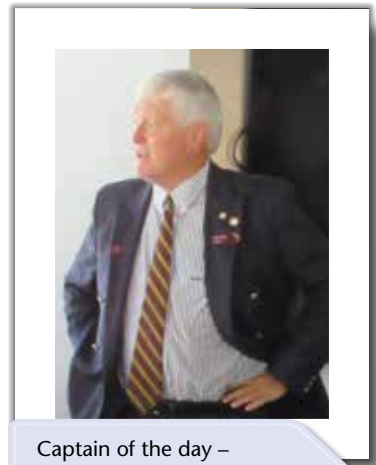

The golf club house is massive and is separate from the main club. We celebrated Ray Ramandh's birthday in the evening at a large hotel suite courtesy of Peter and Magda Bailey.



## Saturday 14 November 2015 Rocas de Sto Domingo

Once again we set off to the coast for our fourth match. The weather was fine on our departure from Santiago but on arrival, as expected, a mist had enveloped some parts of the course and temperatures were significantly lower due to the prevailing Pacific Ocean cool breezes which are experienced in this region south of Valparaíso.

This course could be loosely compared to an inland "Parkland course" with high pine tree lined rye/fescue fairways and fairly open driving areas. Some holes had steep approaches which required approach shots of pinpoint accuracy to score well.

The original 18 hole course was developed in the 1940's and subsequently another new nine holes were added. Today the layout consists of three nine hole groups (Red, White and Blue nines) consisting of old and new holes which blend in to make two very interesting courses. We played on the Red/Blue course combination with holes stroked one to nine on both sides making the match play shot allocations fairly testing.

The lunch served was the usual sumptuous affair with excellent wines to complement the excellent cuisine of Chile.

Gonzalo Vergara officiated at the prize giving supported by Jorge Lopex (ex-President of AGOSECH) who presented Terry Knight, our Captain of the day, with a very appropriate wooden plaque in pine to commemorate our match.

## Sunday 15 November 2015 Club de Golf Lomas De Dehesa

This Sunday game represented the midpoint of our golf tour and was a short drive from the hotel. With much less Sunday traffic, departure was at 10:00 and arrival at 10.30. Much to everyone's surprise, the club was almost deserted. After fearing that we were at the wrong venue and making the necessary telephonic enquiries, we gathered that we had arrived early as our planned match tee times were from 14:00 onwards.

With three hours to kill and suffering from sleep deprivation, the general expressed irritation from the majority was understandable. Our AGOSECH captain of the day, Ernesto Almarza, quickly realised the problem of our miscommunication and opened the course to those who thought they required the extra practice and also arranged for the ladies who were not interested in golf to play bridge and/or dominoes, thus keeping all occupied in the interim.

Lomas De Dehesa is set in fairly undulated terrain with a river flowing through both nine-hole layouts. Being 30 to 40 years old, the course was probably first a nine-hole test and later extended to 18 holes, judging by the different planted grasses (cynodon and kikuyu) on each side.

Fairways were cut through existing wooded areas and many holes were severely dog-legged and presented very tight driving lines. The river flowing through the course came into play often and some large ponds

All the greens were very slow when compared to the other courses we had played which had a direct impact on our scoring. We were again outplayed by our hosts and lost the game by 1½ and 4½.

Inspite of the loss, we enjoyed a great barbeque (braai) after the game, accompanied by much outstanding wine, which reminded us of home style meat preparation and consumption.

Prince of Wales Country Club (PWCC)**

PWCC was founded in 1925. Edward the Prince of Wales, laid the founding stone for the club in 1927 hence the Prince of Wales emblem of three feathers was adopted as the club emblem.

This is a British style Parkland course with holes framed by trees close to the Bermuda fairways. Greens of A1 bent are very well protected by bunkers with water in play on the 9th and 18th holes.

As a true country club, other facilities at PWCC included a hockey pitch, two rugby fields, a few small football pitches, 12 tennis courts, four squash courts and indoor and outdoor swimming pools, spa and gymnasium.

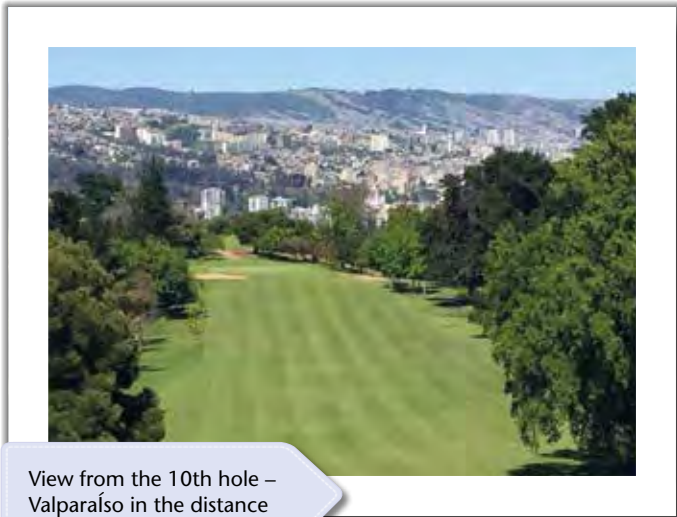

Of Chile's 4000km plus coastline, the brief central strip between Rocas de Santo Domingo and Los Vilos, is the most visited and developed. Known as the Litoral Central, this 250km stretch boasts bay after bay lined with wonderful white sand beaches and a string of coastal resort towns such as Cachagua where we played earlier. Valparaíso and Vina Del Mar sit next to each other near the middle of this central strip.

Prior to finally arriving at Granadilla, our previous city tour guide who accompanied us on the bus trip, took us on a sight-seeing route to Vina Del Mar via the beach front drive. The cold Humbolt current flowing along the coast has a similar negative impact on swimming activities, as is the case at Clifton in Cape Town.

Most of the team were fairly comfortable finally playing on a course with kikuyu fairways and fast bent greens. The biggest surprise to all, apart from the generous Chile opponents' handicaps, was the local rule adopted which allowed placing at any point on the course. This rule was explained to us during the course of the match and taken advantage of immediately.

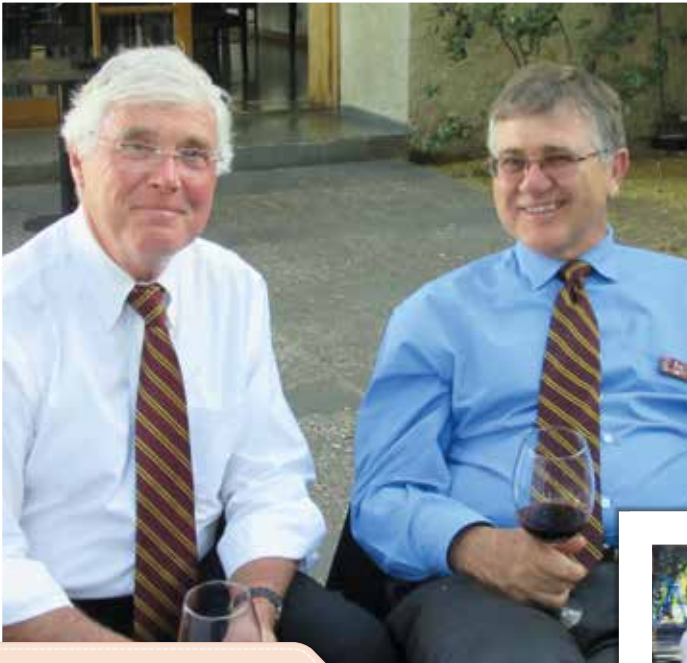

It was also mentioned that the tour group had been lucky not to have suffered from exhaustion or any injuries throughout this very strenuous two week period covering nine matches.

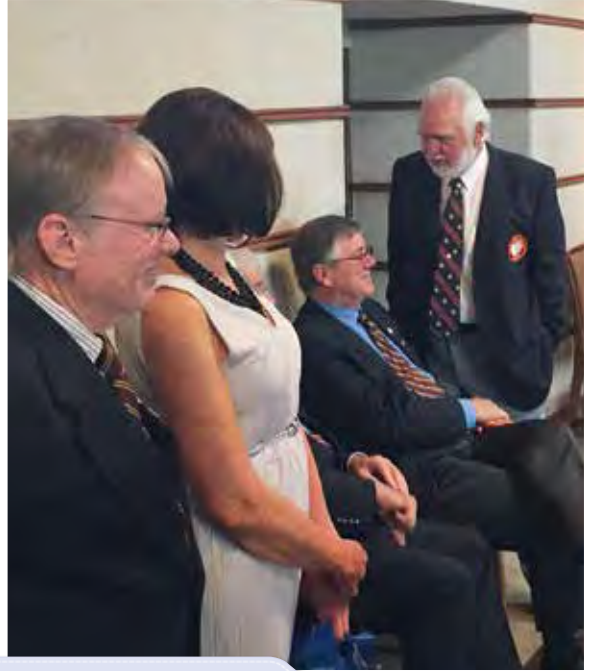

## Thursday 12 November 2015

### A day of leisure in the mountains!

We visited the Andes Mountains and Valle Nevado Ski Resort. The Andes is the world’s longest mountain range (on land). The Andes runs along the west coast of South America for approximately 7000 km with an average height of 4000 m. The Andes Mountains provide a stunning backdrop to Santiago and are very popular with tourists seeking active day trips outside of the city. Hiking, rafting, horse-riding and skiing are the most popular activities. We ascended in the bus and travelled a very winding road up the mountain with a slight delay to the top due to a broken-down truck obstructing the narrow mountain road.

We sighted many Andean Condors (vultures) high up in the Andes. The Condor is a large black vulture with a ruff of white feathers surrounding the base of the neck and, especially in the male, large white patches on the wings. The head and neck are nearly featherless, and are a dull red colour, which may flush and therefore change colour in response to the bird’s emotional state. In the male, there is a wattle on the neck and a large, dark red comb or caruncle on the crown of the head. Unlike most birds of prey, the male is larger than the female.

**Monday 16 November 2015**  
**Indómita wine tour**

... a wonderful day of rest and visit to Indómita for good wine and food ...

Located in close proximity to Santiago and the Pacific Ocean and surrounded by thick vineyards, Indómita is the only winery in the area that offers a panoramic view of the Casablanca valley, demonstrating its strong, dominant spirit.

Its imposing state-of-the-art cellar with capacity for 27 million litres dominates the Casablanca valley. Its barrel room and imposing terrace make it a must-visit destination that includes tours, horseback riding, wine tasting, and one of the country's best restaurants.

Its vineyards are located in the Casablanca valley, close to the Pacific Ocean, under optimal conditions for white varieties and Pinot Noir; in the Maipo Valley, the birthplace of Chilean wine production and an ideal area for red wines; and the Biobío valley, a cool and rainy place that is perfect for growing noble varieties.

The winery's white construction that emerges among the hills and green vineyards of the Casablanca valley is clearly visible from the highway that leads to the coast. Its short 70 kilometres from Santiago and 40 kilometres from the Pacific Ocean make Indómita a natural tourist destination.

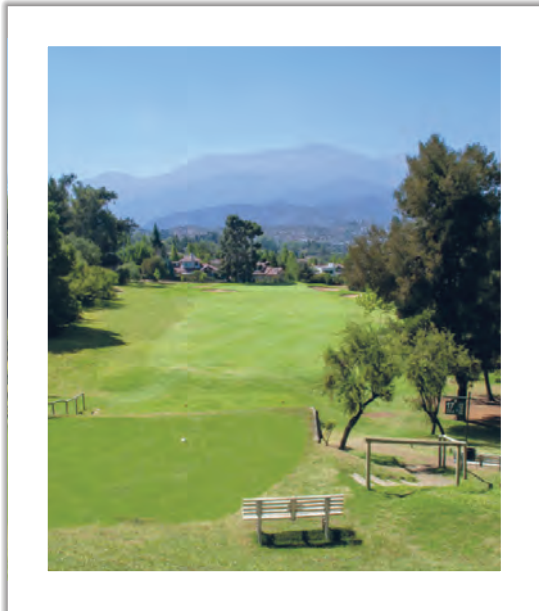
