Operational information

CHAMPIONSHIP PLAY

Competitors with a handicap of 7 or less will compete for the Championship on a Stroke Play basis (Gross only) on Wednesday and Thursday. They will also participate in the Stableford competitions alongside other players.

HANDICAP RATINGS

Just prior to the commencement of our tournament all player handicap indices are extracted from the handicaps database. Your handicap index is fixed for the duration of the tournament. Depending on the course, the tee positions and the competition being played your handicap index is converted into your daily handicap. This daily handicap will be shown on your score card which you will receive on your starting tee.

THE DRAW

In making the draw preference has been given to ensuring players have two rounds on each course, do not play with players from their own society except during the Pinehurst, and do not play with the same player more than once. In addition where possible, tee times have been arranged to try and assist players with similar travel arrangements and a variety of other requests. If all requests cannot be fulfilled, the Tournament Director apologizes to anyone who may be inconvenienced.

ONE SET OF TEES

The tournament will be played from a single set of tees. Please report to the Starter on the tee at least 10 minutes before your tee-off time.

CLASS COMPETITIONS

Class groupings have been established to ensure fair competition among players of similar age. Winners and runners-up of Class E will receive the Methuselah cup and trophy, reserved for members older than 75 at the registration date. For other players, an algorithm will distribute them into 4 classes (A to D) based on age. Class allocations will be communicated in your welcome letter.

SCORE CARDS

Score cards and local rules will be provided by the Starters at the tee of the course you are playing. Complete and submit your scorecard immediately upon completing your round. Your daily score card will include your competition handicap that is derived from your handicap index extracted from the handicaps database just prior to the tournament.

SLOW PLAY

To maintain a reasonable pace of play, please:Speed up your own play and that of your partners.

- Pick up if you cannot score or improve your partner's score.
- Ensure you keep up with the group ahead.
- Respect the requests of Course Marshals.
 Offenders may be penalized under Rule 5.6a.
- No practising is allowed on the course during play.

TWO CLUBS

The entry fee for the two clubs has already been prepaid. You may claim your two clubs when submitting your scorecards to the official scorers for checking. Please note that no two clubs will be awarded for the Pinehurst competition.

PRIZES

Players may receive only one prize for individual events on any given day (excluding team events). In the event of a tie, the older or more senior players will be declared the winners.

Winners of the Monday and Tuesday competitions will receive their prizes at the end of the Annual Members Meeting on Tuesday, 7th May at Royal Durban golf club in the main dining hall.

Presentation of prizes for the Championship and related events will be held during the Gala Dinner on the Thursday evening in the Sea Cottage Room at Greyville race course.

DRESS CODE AFTER PLAY

Smart casual attire is recommended. Kindly wear your name badges after golf and at all social functions.

GOLF CARTS

Golf carts are available for players who requested them during entry submission. Golf Cart and caddie allocations are shown in your welcome letter.

Cart fees are R350 at RDGC and R500 at DCC.

Players requiring golf carts on Sunday for the mixed competition should make arrangements with Royal Durban Golf Club 031 309 1373.

CADDIES

Caddie fees are R350 at both RDGC and DCC.

& Durban Country Club

Durban Country Club, located in Durban, South Africa, has a rich history dating back to the end of World War I when the idea of establishing a Country Club in Durban first emerged. At the time, country clubs were gaining popularity in other parts of South Africa, and with Durban's reputation as a leading seaside resort, the need for such an amenity became evident for both residents and visitors.

One of the driving forces behind the club's creation was the need for a second golf course in Durban due to the persistent flooding problems faced by the Durban Golf Club (now Royal Durban). The existing golf club, located on a low-lying swamp at Greyville, frequently suffered from flooding, causing golf events to be cancelled. In 1920, the floods made the course virtually unplayable for the South African Golf Championships, raising concerns that Durban might not be asked to host the event again in 1924.

George Waterman, with assistance from fellow professional golfer Laurie Waters, took on the challenge of building the Durban Country Club's golf course. Their work was labour-intensive, involving manual earth-moving, flattening giant sand dunes, clearing dense vegetation, and removing trees.

Durban Country Club officially opened on December 9, 1922, with George Waterman having the honour of hitting the first ball on what would become one of the world's most famous golf courses. The members were so impressed with Waterman's design that they commissioned the Waterman Cup, a golf trophy in his honour, which was first contested in 1924.

Throughout its history, Durban Country Club has played a significant role in South African golf. Legendary players like Sam Snead, Jack Nicklaus, Sally Little, Ernie Els, Sid Brews, Bobby Locke, Papwa Sewgolum, and Gary Player have achieved some of their greatest golfing moments here. The club has hosted 17 South African Opens, more than any other club in South Africa, and was the proud host of the Centenary SA Open in 2010. The golf course offers stunning views overlooking the Blue Lagoon estuary and the Indian Ocean. It has witnessed remarkable moments in golf history, including Gary Player's first South African Open victory in 1956 and Ernie Els' third South African Open win in 1998.

The club's classic Cape Dutch style Clubhouse, designed by architects Wallace Paton and WG (Billy) Moffat, overlooks the course. In the backdrop, the iconic Moses Mabhida Stadium adds to the scenic beauty of the surroundings.

Durban Country Club continues to be a cherished icon both nationally and internationally, preserving a rich legacy of golfing excellence that spans over a century.


Starting from December 1st, Durban Country Club will proudly unveil its newly revamped golf course. This eagerly awaited renovation follows the unfortunate flooding that severely impacted the course in 2022. The floods, which caused extensive damage, left the course in a state of disarray, putting a temporary halt to the club's golfing activities.

World-renowned golfer Gary Player, who has a special connection to the club, had remarked that he had never seen the course looking so good shortly before the floods hit. His endorsement of the course's quality added to the anticipation surrounding the venue. However, just two months later, the devastating floods disrupted the course, highlighting the challenges of maintaining a golf course in a region susceptible to such natural events.

Despite the setbacks, Durban Country Club's commitment to providing a world-class golfing experience remains unwavering. The forthcoming reopening of the revamped golf course signifies the club's determination to restore its historic and prestigious course to its former glory, ready to welcome golf enthusiasts from around the world once again.









Royal Durban

Royal Durban Golf Club was first established in 1892 as the Durban Golf Club after a local bank manager approached the town council about creating a Golf Club in Durban and was duly granted permission to lay out a links designed course on the grounds within the Greyville Racecourse.

The first course was a far cry from the professionally landscaped grounds of today. There were no actual greens - only scuffed ground on hard clay surfaces, and the fairways were not planted, the grass was merely cut by a reaper drawn by oxen.

In 1932, the Durban Golf Club was rebuilt with a brand new clubhouse replacing the original wood and iron shanty and a new layout was designed by Bob Grimsdell, a qualified architect from Colt & Allison of London, Paris and New York.

The course became known for its punishing rough, which was the only defense it had, apart from the prevailing winds. Large and bulky trees and bushes were not allowed in the design of the course for the simple reason that they would obscure the view of the racetrack. With the advent of television the restriction changed with trees and bushes now adorning many parts of the course. One of the proudest moments in the history of the Club was on April 1932 when, following a visit from the Prince of Wales in 1925, Durban Golf Club was granted permission to use the prefix "Royal" by King George V, making it one of only four clubs in South Africa to obtain this honour.

Royal Durban Golf Club is one of very few golf courses to be situated in the middle of a horse racing track and has hosted some renowned golfing tournaments over it's 130 year history including the Commonwealth Tournament in 1975 (which saw Nick Faldo playing at the tender age of eighteen), the S.A. Open, The Players Championship, the S.A. Amateur Championships and The Nelson Mandela Trophy.

Management Committee Report

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I am pleased, on behalf of MANCOM, to submit this report of our Union for the year ended 31 December 2023. The year was a relatively quiet one without any outgoing or incoming tours but our National Tournament held for the first time in Pretoria and hosted by the Gauteng North Society was both enjoyable and successful. Generally, the Union remains on a sound footing with a secure financial base and an effective tournament computer system which is continually being updated and refined. This year we look forward to again enjoying the hospitality of the KZN Society as they host the National Tournament in Durban and, as in the past, we expect this venue to be popular amongst the members of our Societies. We are delighted to welcome to Durban the delegation from the Senior Golfers' Society of Zambia and trust that they will thoroughly enjoy the Tournament.

At the Union's AGM to be held during the course of the National Tournament it is proposed to amend the Union's Constitution to clarify the nature and determination of the quotas which apply to the Societies. In this regard we acknowledge the gestures of good fellowship of the Gauteng and KZN Societies in voluntarily giving up some quota numbers to allow their reallocation to various coastal societies which are experiencing a limitation to their growth on account of their existing quotas.

Notwithstanding the fact that certain coastal Societies are growing in number, which is, to some extent, due to relocations from upcountry, several Societies are facing an aging and contracting membership, particularly active membership. Evidence of this is to be found in the falling number of entries over the past years for our Annual Tournament and the difficulty in filling the teams for our International Tours. While the challenges faced by certain of our Societies in this regard are fully appreciated it is hoped that those Societies will re-double their efforts going forward to secure suitable candidates for membership.

FINANCIAL REPORT

We are pleased to report that your Union continues on a sound financial footing and a summary of the unaudited financial statements is attached for your information. Audited financial statements will be available to members of the Governing Body shortly.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The financial statements again reflect an acceptable situation for the Union showing a surplus for the year (before the revaluation of investments) of R91 619 versus the previous year's surplus of R18 049.

Congratulations are due to the Northern Gauteng Society for achieving a surplus of R30 399 in hosting their inaugural 2023 National Tournament.

Income from investments comprising both interest and dividends amounted to R238 042 versus R195 210 in 2022.

There were no major variances from our operating budget during the year and the level of administration expenses was well contained

The market value of our equities portfolio appreciated during the year. The fair value increased by R215 429 from the prior year (2022 – decrease of R50 115).

The investment fair value reserve is currently stated at R863 911 (2022 – R648 482).

During the year, R202 290 ABSA preference shares were purchased from our cash reserves.

Budget

A budget for the year ending 31 December 2024 is attached and reflects a proposed loss of R60 195 (2023 – Budgeted loss R56 814). Consistent with prior years, this budgeted loss is stated before making provision for any development grants to societies.

TOURS

In 2023 there were no incoming or outgoing Senior Golfing tours for SGUSA.

Preparations for the 2024 March tour to Chile progressed well and we are sending a team of 11 members and their partners on a two week tour.

Once again, it was very difficult to attract enough participants for the tour, resulting in our team being one member short and having no reserves. This is becoming difficult for us participating in outgoing tours to the fullest extent that our hosts would expect. One could expect that the cost factor plays a big part in the tours to the UK and Australia but Chile by comparison is quite a cheap tour. Perhaps this needs more debate at the governing body meeting during this year's Nationals.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Following a resolution at the SGUSA 2023 AGM, a facility was constructed and implemented to enable direct communication via email from Mancom to Society members.

This function is reserved for a select group of system administrators ensuring that the volume of emails dispatched directly from Mancom to Society members remains judiciously controlled.

Recent instances of such correspondence includes emails concerning the SGUSA tour to Chile and the KZN national tournament.

Additionally, a facility was devised to streamline the tournament registration process. Instead of the traditional in-person registration at the tournament office on the eve of the tournament, participants will now have the convenience of self-registration via the SGUSA website during the 2 days preceding the tournament.

This facility will be accessible for the KZN tournament in 2024. Seniors who have been accepted for the tournament will receive instructions regarding the process prior to the event.



Renovation Lifts Durban CC To new heights

Members of the Senior Golfers' Society are fortunate to be playing the new-look, renovated Durban Country Club at our national tournament. DCC is now a private members club and this will be a rare week when a majority of visitors are allowed to take over the clubhouse and course.

Providence has dictated we are afforded the privilege of each having two rounds at a course which through a devastating force of nature has risen from the lowliest abyss to resume its place as one of the great layouts in world golf. The Senior Nationals would have been scheduled for Durban in May 2022 had it not been for Covid lockdowns postponing it for consecutive years in 2020-21. But that tournament would likely have been cancelled, because April 2022 saw unparalleled flooding in the city. We would otherwise not be at Durban CC this week.

Country Club has suffered regular flooding in its 101-year history, yet nothing on the scale of 2022. A 10-day deluge wreaked catastrophic damage. The Umgeni River end of the course resembled a muddy dam, with many holes underwater. It was to be almost three months before all 18 were open again, yet in awful shape.

A benefit of such destruction was the realisation that this was the perfect opportunity to rebuild and reshape the course for the 21st century. And the club had a benefactor in Nick Jonsson who could make it happen financially. His forefathers had been club members – his paternal grandfather won the Prince of Wales Cup in 1929 – and Jonsson was proud of the club's heritage and place in the history of the city. He had been dismayed by its decline in this century, and wanted to restore DCC to the lofty pinnacle it once enjoyed.

Golf Data, a company renowned for its excellent work in course design and construction, was entrusted with the renovation of all 18 holes starting in May 2023. Their vision proposal was to refine and enhance the course to a standard that would enable the club to maintain its status as one of the world's best, respecting and accentuating iconic features. To my mind they have succeeded beyond everyone's aspirations. The project overran, yet to achieve such a stunning transformation of DCC in 10 months is extraordinary.



Seniors who haven't visited DCC in recent years will be surprised by the open space around the front of the clubhouse. No thick vegetation between first and 18th fairways, just grassy dunes. And the tees for No 1 have been relocated to the side of the clubhouse, flanked by new short-game and putting greens.

In places the course is unrecognisable, particularly holes at the far end, Nos 6-7-10-11-13-14-15, given a creative and distinctive makeover that didn't exist before. A lengthy burn, quite wide too and spanned by beautiful flat bridges, meanders between and around most of them. The burn is there to avert future flooding and is filled by rising ground water.

The 18 new greens have bent grass surfaces for the first time at a coastal KZN course. Some occupy new sites, such as 6 and 14, while others have shifted slightly. No 17 is sensational, the green pushed left into a high dune. Prince of Wales (par-3 12th) has a Biarritz "dent" in the middle of its large tabletop green which will be a talking point.

The renovation has seen the disappearance of a "parkland" theme (along with unsightly areas), replaced by more natural wild grasses and bunkering which convey how DCC is assumed to have looked in early years. Its scenic splendour has been revealed more than ever before by removing tropical foliage (not all) and allowing an uninterrupted vista of views from hole to hole.

The courses for 2025



Schoeman Park Golf Club, located to the east of Bloemfontein, is a golf course with a rich history dating back to 1904. The club was established by a group of Scottish members of the Railway Institute who began playing on a nine-hole course on SAR property. Over time, the course has undergone significant changes, with the present-day 18-hole course being designed by course architect Bob Grimsdell and officially opened in 1952.

The course was initially situated in an ecologically fragile wetland, and much of it had to be drained. Additionally, bluegum trees were planted to keep the clay-based ground dry. Today, these trees define the course and add to its classic parkland charm. Recent years have seen successful greens committees committed to planting indigenous trees around the course. The course may be short at 6500 meters at full stretch and 1370 meters above sea level, but the bluegum trees can severely punish wayward shots.

The clubhouse offers modern bar, kitchen, and dressing-room facilities and a large hall for functions and receptions. Furthermore, the club has a pro shop and adequate practice tee/green facilities. The golf academy, which has produced several players active on the Sunshine Circuit in recent years, is also worth mentioning. Over the years, Schoeman Park has hosted many regional and national events, including professional tour events in the 1970s and 80s, where players such as Mark McNulty, John Bland, Cobie le Grange, Tony Johnstone, and a young Ernie Els participated. The golf course has also hosted South African Men's and Ladies' Amateur Championships and interprovincial championships. Finally, it is worth mentioning that Schoeman Park is renowned for its tradition of offering excellent golfing facilities at an affordable cost.



The Bloemfontein Golf Club has a rich history dating back to 1894 when it was first established on the city's southern outskirts. The original 18-hole course was designed by the renowned architect Robert Grimsdell and was known as the "top course" in its heyday. The course was situated in what is now the Gen. De Wet suburb and boasted Kimberley blue greens.

In the 1950s, the club was relocated to the eastern side of the city, and the course was redesigned by Peter Matkovich in 1995. The changes included new greens, dynamic shaping of holes, new tee positions, and bunker placements. The result is a beautifully maintained course that is rated among the top 100 courses in the country.

The clubhouse has a sizeable bar, lounge area, kitchen, and adequate dressing room and shower facilities. There is also a well-stocked pro shop and a generously sized driving range that is open to the public.

Over the years, the Bloemfontein Golf Club has hosted several prestigious events, including the SA Open championships in 1958 and 1964. Most recently, in March 2023, the club hosted the Nomads Cheetah Nationals.

The club takes pride in hosting such events and ensures that all attendees leave with fond memories. Whether you're a seasonaed golfer or a beginner, the Bloemfontein Golf Club offers a challenging course and a warm welcome to all visitors.

It's a privilege to host the 2025 Senior National Tournament, and the club looks forward to all seniors walking away with fond memories.
